## 1.... ELEMENTARY

hen Juan moves through the halls of McCarver Elementary, he admits that he can be a little bit of a smarty pants.

"I like it when the younger kids see me and shout out, 'Hey Juan,' and all my friends are like, 'How do you know them?... It's because I'm a McCarver Scholar, and when you've been here for as long as I have, you help out the younger kids."

Over the past 4 years, Juan has grown into a student leader that other students look to for guidance, and it's a role he takes seriously.

Juan joined the program during the summer before 2nd grade. The child of two Spanish-speaking parents, Juan initially struggled with his reading and writing. It affected his confidence in the classroom.

"My mom signed me up for the summer," Juan said. "I just thought it would be fun to hang out with my friends and go on fields trips."

A lot of the older students helped

Juan with his writing and made him feel more comfortable raising his hand. Now, reading is one of his favorite activities.

"Most people don't like going to school. But at McCarver Scholars, everyone wants to come because if you have this, there's always something to look forward to."

hen an older student told Katelynn about the Hilltop Scholars program in 7th grade, she signed up right away. She was having a hard time keeping her grades up and thought Hilltop Scholars was a great way to do something about it.

"Joining Hilltop Scholars last year really made a huge difference. My grades went from a C to a B+ and I had more opportunities to learn with all the different activities after school."

For Katelynn, one of the most important parts of being a Scholar was the connection with people. Having her own Academic Coach, someone to help her through the day and help her stay on track, was invaluable in her quest to improve academically.

"Both the Academic Coaches and the tutors made me feel like people cared about my success. I got help planning my schoolwork and finishing assignments after school."

Being a Hilltop Scholar also, opened Katelynn's eyes to find new ways

#### to challenge herself. Before getting involved with Peace Community Center, Katelynn says she'd never really

involved with Peace Community Center, Katelynn says she'd never really considered college, but now she's got big plans for herself.

"Now, I've visited a few colleges and I'm interested in attending St. Martin's and pursuing an engineering degree to hopefully become a computer technician."

Our after school and summer program helps students build academic skills, prepare for high school and take part in enrichment activities, like robotics and glee club.

hen Juwan started 9th grade at Foss High School, he joined Hilltop Scholars. Having space where he could hang out and have fun was tremendously impactful to his life, and with hard work and encouragement, Juwan looked at his future critically after a difficult time in high school.

However, he wasn't immediately interested in attending a four-year university. He started working toward his Associate's degree at a community college but quickly decided a fulltime job would be a better short-term strategy while he figured out what career he wanted to pursue.

Juwan jumped at the opportunity to return to Peace Community Center when the chance came, joining the staff this year as a Murdock Vision and Call Intern with the high school team.

"I'm excited to use this opportunity to focus on giving back to the community that helped me so much! Being a Vision and Call Intern gives me the opportunity to grow as a person and learn something new, even as I prepare to go to back to school to start my long-term career."

This year, Juwan is going back to school to finish up his Associate's with a long-term goal of earning a degree in marketing.


